LEARNING THROUGH **DESIGN:**

THE USE OF DIGITAL TOOLS TO INVESTIGATE TEACHERS' USE OF TIKTOK

PURPOSE

The purpose of the research study is to sample the online experiences of six elementary preservice teachers in the University of Arkansas's Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) program. The study examines the preservice teachers' use of social media to find professional resources to use in the classroom during their year of internship teaching and the process of finding classroom management teaching resources through social media.


Classroom management is a system of proactive and reactive strategies that teachers use to influence the physical and social space of the classroom to foster learning.

RESEARCH QUESTIONS

RQ1: How do elementary preservice teachers use social media as a classroom management teaching resource?

RQ 2: What evaluative criteria do preservice teachers apply when choosing classroom management teaching resources on social media?

RQ 3: To what extent are classroom management teaching resources found on social media implemented in the classroom?



BACKGROUND

Bandura's Cognitive Learning Theories

Preservice teachers observed others' actions on social media (TikTok) following Bandura's social cognitive learning theory as they imitated and implemented the strategies in the classroom. These strategies often involve a form of reward or consequence

Classroom Management Strategies

Classroom management can be organized into three areas: behavior management (whole-class or individual), environment expectations, or instructional expectations. Through social media, preservice teachers accessed classroom management resources to add to their teacher




Phase 1: Identify the Cultural Site

The first phase was conducted with the six elementary preservice interns to determine the social media cultural site. TikTok was the ultimate site due to the frequency of use by the teachers, the online content, and online discussion forums.

Phase 2: Netnography to Understand Teachers on TikTok

The second phase, netnography, a form of ethnography following prescribed research steps developed by Kozinets (2020), follows an eight-week intensive study analyzing classroom management videos on TikTok.







Phase 3: Collaborative Digital Diaries

Phase three involved the collaborative digital diaries with the researcher and the preservice teachers following teachers on TikTok for five weeks. This was paralleled with classroom observations.

Phase 4: Larger Study

Phase four will be completed with twenty-five interns reviewing the videos curated in phase three. Additionally, the preservice teachers will collaboratively keep their own digital diaries.




The video had comments about Ukraine... Hmmm. There is a war going on in <u>Ukraine</u> but I am not sure the relevar


